
The first is the close physical connection with the Park. Most volunteers live nearby and use the Park regularly. They may be devotees of the out of doors,

### Conservancy Launches First Earth Day Celebration

A fter more than two years of cancelled programming, Carl Schurz Park Conservancy is proud to inaugurate the 2022 season with Every Day is Earth Day. This self-guiding, interactive outdoor exhibit will invite visitors to learn about park ecosystems and the Conservancy's role in ensuring the park's long-term health and sustainability.

The exhibit, to open on April 23rd, will be accompanied by a park-wide event from 1-4 p.m. which will include activities for all ages and special projects for children. Participants will discover aspects of our fascinating worlds above and below ground. Experts will be on hand to discuss topics such as birds,

pollinating insects, fungi, lichen, and native plants and trees. In addition, one of our Earth Day partners, the Billion Oyster Project (BOP) will host demonstrations of oyster cage monitoring at the ferry dock adjacent to the North Lawn.

The Every Day is Earth Day initiative is an exciting opportunity for the Conservancy to promote a deeper understanding of the park. The exhibit, which will remain up through the summer, will allow neighbors, visitors, and school groups alike to learn about the value of this environmental asset and gain insights regarding the benefits of urban greenspaces.

## Beyond Caring for the Park

inger Holton and Dianne JWeisheit-Olenick have been volunteering with Carl Schurz Park Conservancy for decades. Ginger has a very active role in recycling the neighborhood's holiday trees at Mulchfest and helps spread much of the Christmas tree mulch every year. Clearly, she is attracted to heavy lifting! Dianne is one of our Zone Gardeners with a gorgeous flower bed on the Esplanade and is on the Gardening Committee. Clearly, she enjoys organizing and managing. For both, civic responsibility is high on their list of priorities. However, for these two, community service doesn't stop at Carl Schurz Park.

For over a decade, Dianne and Ginger have been working with other non-profit organizations geared towards helping homeless animals. Their shared love for these creatures brought them together in the park where they bonded while dragging trees for Mulchfest. At any given time, you might find them working at the ASPCA, the ACC (the city's Animal Care Center) or The Washington Heights Cat Colony. They have had an enormous impact on the lives of countless displaced and discarded animals.

Dianne's love for animals came naturally as her father was a veterinarian. Over the years, she has worked primarily with cats and opens her home to foster when the shelters become overwhelmed. Fostering kittens is particularly demanding as they must be bottle fed around the clock. Her own adopted cats help socialize the orphans although sometimes Dianne will need to spend hours at a time comforting them in a quiet space.

Ginger has great experience working with shelter dogs and, through the years, has adopted several. She was lucky enough to have her last pup for 16 years and continues to work at the shelters in honor of him. Working with larger dogs comes easy to her as she grew up with Shepherds and Huskies. You can often find Ginger in the park walking and acclimating newly rescued dogs.

Ginger has also driven around the country on emergency rescue missions to help transport dogs from overcrowded shelters to shelters where chances of adoption are high. On one occasion, she co-piloted a van with 40 pups from Alabama to Wisconsin where they were all adopted within the month!

Recently, a large contribution was made to Carl Schurz Park Conservancy in honor of Ginger and Dianne by a fellow animal lover who knew how much the park meant to them. They were so touched to have inspired such a meaningful gift.

Clearly, on the ground or in the shelters, these two represent volunteerism and humanity at its best!








